September 20th, 2PM, Northern Harmony

Northern Harmony, a collaboration of ten brilliant singers presenting harmony singing from across the world, presents a concert for Lamoille Neighbors at the Second Congregational Church in Hyde Park. Led by Larry Gordon, Northern Harmony is the highest level performing group under the umbrella of the world music organization Village Harmony, which sponsors singing camps and workshops in New England and many parts of the world. (see www.villageharmony.org) Touring Europe regularly since 1995, the group has won wide acclaim for their unique repertoire and sure command of widely diverse traditional singing styles. Most of the veteran singers in the present ensemble have studied traditional singing styles first hand with native teachers in South Africa, Corsica and Caucasus Georgia. Some are leaders of their own ensembles. The singers, all vaccinated, have been in residence for a week in Marshfield preparing this concert program.

The program presents a thrilling mix of world harmony traditions including South African songs and dances, traditional polyphony from Georgia, Bulgaria, Macedonia, and Corsica, contemporary American shape-note songs, and Renaissance Italian devotional songs. They will also include new songs by member of the group.

South Africa has a particularly powerful and appealing folk harmony singing tradition, with a rich, resonant vocal sound, and wonderfully syncopated rhythm. The singing is always accompanied by dancing, with the rhythm of the dance movements often in counterpoint to the song.

Georgia's ancient three-part harmony singing tradition features a dark, sonorous vocal quality, and startling harmonies, unlike anything in European music. Traditional Corsican singing, passed down through oral tradition, features two highly ornamented upper voices over a more sustained harmonic bass. The Balkan numbers feature the characteristic bright, "hard-voiced" vocal timbre, with dissonant harmonies frequently based on drones, and irregular dance meters in 7, 9 and 11. These pieces will also feature the Northern Harmony band of fiddle, penny whistle, accordion and percussion. The band will also play a medley of traditional dance tunes.

This program will be a real treat and we welcome members and volunteers. There is plenty of room to maintain social distance. Members and volunteers attending need to be vaccinated and wear a mask. Please sign up on line or by calling 802-585-1233.

Slow Cooker Basil Chicken in Coconut Curry Sauce (this is the delicious dish that Kathy Geiersbach brought to the annual meeting potluck).

6 bone-in chicken thighs, remove skin	1/2 tsp chili powder
salt and pepper	1 large red onion chopped
1 tsp oil	8 cloves garlic
2 cans coconut milk	2 jalapeños, seeded and finely chopped
2 TBSP dried basil leaves	1 TBSP cornstarch
2 tsp salt	1TBSP COLD water
3/4 tsp pepper	1tsp grated or minced ginger
1 and 1/2 TBSP yellow curry powder	1/3 to 1/2 cup cilantro chopped

Salt and pepper each thigh. Heat a large skillet to medium-high heat. Add tsp oil. Add 3 chicken thighs. Cook for about 2 minutes until nicely browned on the bottom. Flip the chicken to brown the other side for about 2-3 minutes. Remove to a plate. Repeat the searing process with the other 3 thighs. If there's not enough grease in the pan you may need to add a little oil.

In a crockpot combine coconut milk, basil, 2 tsp. salt, 3/4 tsp pepper, yellow curry, and chili powder. Stir to combine. Add the chopped onion, garlic and jalapeños. Add the browned chicken and stir to combine. Cook for 4-5 hours on high or 6-8 on low.

Remove the chicken from the cooker and let it cool a little.

Add the ginger to the slow cooker. Combine the cornstarch and 1 TBSP of COLD water. Stir until it is not lumpy. Add this to the crock pot and stir.

Shred the chicken, removing the bones. It should be falling apart.

Return the meat to the slow cooker and stir. Put the lid on and cook for another 10 minutes.

Season with salt and pepper to taste. Stir in cilantro.

Serve with rice.



A big thank you to the board and all the committee members who make Lamoille Neighbors run, to all our volunteers who are the heart of our organization and to Bonnie, our program manager who keeps it all together.

Bonnie presented data for the annual meeting and here's a summary for the past fiscal year, August 2020-August 2021.

Members - Total 59

Over the last year we gained 17 new members (8/21) Covid – Over last 8 months of Covid– gained 6 members Since vaccines – April-Aug, last 4 months – gained 10 members 47% Members are also volunteers

Volunteers - Total 53, with 7 on committees, 46 provide services

Number of volunteers by service: 25 drivers, 20 handy persons, 28 friendly visitors, 24 grocery deliverers, 15 gardeners, 14 computer helpers #1 Most Active Volunteer – performed 20% of requests or 49 services!

Service Requests - Total 245

During Covid we averaged 12-25 services/mth. Once our volunteers and members were vaccinated we averaged 30/mth. with a peak of 40 services in June.

Most Requested- #1 Driving at 40% (98 rides), #2 Friendly Visits at 33% (81 visits or calls), #3 Handy Person at 13% (14 services) and #4 Deliveries/groceries/meals at 8% (8 services).

<u>Members Using Services</u> - 33% of membership (19) use services.

<u>Events-</u> In our fiscal year 2020-2021 we had approximately 100 events/offerings. We average 12-30 in attendance.

Until we have more information about the risk of covid 19 with people who are vaccinated, we are asking members and volunteers to wear a mask during services. Lamoille Neighbors serves a vulnerable age group. We want to do everything we can to protect each other.

When we have indoor events we will all wear masks and maintain social distance.

We are following this situation closely and will notify you if we make further changes.

We are all in this together and want to support each other through this next challenge.

Notable Sculptors of Barre Gray Granite

Vermont Granite Museum Barre, Vermont

August 5 - October 30, 2021

Nan is showcasing her photography at the Vermont Granite Museum. This exhibit starts with a nod to the history of the Granite Industry in Vermont. The railway



extension to Barre in 1875 followed by a stall for Barre Gray Granite at the Chicago World's Fair of 1893, put Barre on the international map. Highly trained and educated sculptors were recruited from Italy and Scotland and the Golden Age of Barre Gray Granite came alive. Their skills, their passion, and their pain set the stage for modern day sculptors. Nan's photographs of the Quarry at Millstone Hill and the monuments carved for Elia Corti and the Bursa family at Hope Cemetery are meant to show the standards set for the generations of sculptors to follow.

The Photography Exhibit continues with the work of 6 Notable Sculptors who are both keeping the traditions alive and moving the work forward in innovative ways. Public Art, Monument Art and Installations continue to flourish - though in different ways to the 20th Century.

These photographs are offered to bring

attention to the story and heartbeat of each of these sculptors. They bring life to the hard inanimate rock of Barre Gray Granite.

The Notable Sculptors include: Guiliano Cecchinelli, Gary Sassi, George Kurjanowicz, Heather Milne Ritchie, Ryan Mays, and Chris Miller. Enjoy exploring their work. Ask questions about what you see and what the sculptors see. What does it mean to make stone come alive? Nan has a Zine available that is specific to the photographs in this exhibit as well as a Photo Book that documents a range of work for each of the artists plus photographs that highlight monuments at Hope Cemetery.

Nan is specifically an iPhone Photographer and used her iPhone 11 Pro for this exhibit. She has been a long time Cannon photographer,



but wanted to take spontaneous photographs in a non-threatening manner. She found that her iPhone is the camera that is always with her and is ready in an instant to capture an image that attracts her photographer's eye. She prefers to work on long term projects, so this photo essay on the Notable Sculptors of Barre Gray Granite captured her attention – and her heart. She also teaches iPhone Photography and has been working with a group of photographers from the Lamoille Neighbors. An exhibit of their work will be at the Morristown Post Office in October and November.

Nan is an iPhone instructor and a member of Lamoille Neighbors.
